

Graduate Diploma (GD)* and Master of Arts (MA) Programs in China Studies

Academic Director:

Min ZHANG, Associate Professor of Humanities

Jointly offered by the Division of Humanities and the Division of Social Science, the Graduate Diploma (GD) and Master of Arts (MA) programs in China Studies are taught programs designed to equip students with a wide range of knowledge about the historical as well as contemporary aspects of China, including literature, religion and philosophy, in addition to politics, economy and society. The programs offer a variety of courses from a number of disciplines, with China being the primary focus of analysis. While the programs are intended to prepare students for a broad spectrum of careers related to China, some have chosen to pursue further studies upon successful completion.

Admission Requirements

Applicants must possess a bachelor's degree from a university or a recognized institution, or have obtained qualifications approved by the University to be equivalent to a first degree.

Program Duration

The MA program can normally be completed in 12 months in full-time mode, or 24 months in part-time mode. Full-time students are required to take a minimum of 9 credits of coursework each regular term, whereas part-time students are required to take a minimum of 3 credits each regular term. With the approval of the Academic Director, a student may take study leave for no more than one regular term.

Program Fee

The total program fee for 2012-13 is HK\$86,000 for the MA program. New students admitted with credit transfer are also required to pay the full program fee. Students who need to retake failed course(s) must pay the pro-rated fee for the necessary course(s).

Curriculum

MA Degree

MA students must take eight courses (24 credits), including two foundation courses (6 credits), four required courses (12 credits), and two elective courses (6 credits).

Graduate Diploma

GD students must take five courses (15 credits), including one foundation course (3 credits), three required courses (9 credits), and one elective course (3 credits)

* *Currently, the GD program does not admit new students.*

2. Required courses

For every term, the Program Office will produce a list of China-related courses drawn from the Division of Humanities and Division of Social Science.

3. Elective courses

Students can take any PG course (and a maximum of one UG course at 4000-level) offered by the School of Humanities and Social Science (courses prefixed by HUMA, SOSC or SSMA).

With prior approval of the Academic Director, students may take other courses offered by the School of Humanities and Social Science to fulfill the program requirements.

Language Requirement

Most courses are taught in English. Students who wish to enroll in courses in which Chinese materials are used and/or Chinese is the teaching medium must be able to demonstrate proficiency in Chinese.

Credit Transfer

Subject to the approval of the Academic Director, graduates from the GD program may transfer up to 15 credits of coursework to the MA program.

Program Transfer

Subject to the approval of the Academic Director, students of the MA program may subsequently apply for transfer to the GD program.

Academic Advising

Upon entering the program, students' progress will be monitored by the Taught Postgraduate Programs Office of the School of Humanities and Social Science.

Graduation Requirements

Students must complete the program with a graduation grade average (GGA) of 2.850 or above as required of all postgraduate students at the University.

Not all foundation courses are offered every year.
